Process	Technique		Possible Influences
Record and explore ideas for first hand observations. Develop ideas. Ask questions about the starting point. Explore work from different artists, periods of time and cultures.	Match colours to artefacts. Use a variety of tools and brush sizes. Experiment with techniques such as layering, mixed media and scarping through. Identify primary colours by name. Mix primary colours to make secondary colours. Add white and black to alter tints and shades. Understand warm and cool colours. Create texture by adding materials such as sand. Use a variety of materials for sculpting, collage and textiles. Experiment with joining and constructing. Explore a variety of images on different backgrounds. Experiment with sorting materials and refining their work. Explore which materials are best to use and have the best results.	Use sculpting techniques including rolling, pinching and cutting. Combine materials through cutting, treating and gluing. Add texture by mixing materials. Sort and arrange materials. Show pattern by weaving Decorate textiles with glue or stitching to add colour and detail.
