School Improvement Update

Our outcomes in statutory assessments have been consistently in line with or above national and local averages over recent years. The below foci are decided on after considering:

- our observations and knowledge of the children currently in the school
- research and pedagogical developments nationally and internationally
- the observations and advice of colleagues in other schools and within TPAT (our academy trust)
- our results in statutory tests (in the context of the children who achieved them)

Below outlines some of our main foci for school improvement this year.

1. Sustain improvements in the amount of greater depth writing across the school and improved outcomes in grammar, punctuation and spelling

We'll do this by adapting and applying successful practices from Key Stage 2 to early years and Key Stage 1; particularly with children's independence and ensuring we have clear curriculum design for delivering grammar, punctuation and spelling knowledge and skills.

2. To increase the number of children working at greater depth in maths

We will use initiatives we have already had success with (club 99, maths clubs, CPA model, mastery pedagogy) and broaden their reach. We will also look at timetabling, events and resources. We will focus particularly on the maths skills of logical problem solving and true fluency (adapting and applying number facts mentally).

3. To ensure learning behaviours continue to be outstanding and that all children are confident to engage with school in the most positive ways

This includes offering support for individual children; maintaining a focus on learning skills and positive mental health for all children; maintaining good attendance and punctuality; ensuring the children have positive relationships with staff and each other.

4. Review assessment and tracking systems to ensure they are efficient and teaching is focused very precisely on children's needs and next steps

5. To ensure all the above has maximum impact on pupil premium children
